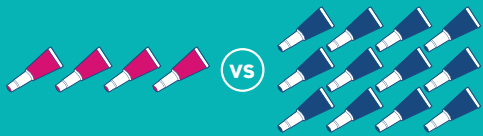

How easy is Felpreva® to apply?

Felpreva® comes as an easy-to-apply spot-on*

Step 1

➤ Use scissors to open the childproof blister, pull the foils apart and remove the spot-on pipette**.



Step 2

➤ Hold upright, twist and pull off the cap, and use the opposite end of the cap to break the seal.

Step 3

➤ Part the fur on the cat's neck at the base of the skull and squeeze the pipette several times to fully release the solution.

Apply only onto intact skin*.**

Problem parasites

There are many different parasites that can affect your cat, from worms to fleas and ticks... the list goes on!

Australian vets say that **25% of cats they see have no protection against parasites¹**

When your cat isn't protected, they can easily pick up these pesky parasites, potentially risking:



Your cat's health and well-being:

- **Discomfort** - from the effects of gut worms to the itchiness of fleas
- **Illness** - paralysis ticks* can be life-threatening and other parasites can transmit nasty diseases to your cat
- **Allergic reactions** - some cats can be allergic to fleas, causing intense itching

You and your family's health:

- Parasites don't always just affect your cat - some can threaten human health, either directly or via the diseases they transmit.



The special bond with your cat:

- Knowing or suspecting that your cat might be carrying parasites can put a strain on your special bond.

The main offenders!



Fleas

Flea bites are super uncomfortable and itchy for your cat and can also result in nasty diseases. Even indoor cats aren't safe from the risk of fleas - so continuous flea protection is recommended for all cats.

Did you know?

Fleas are a year-round problem.



Ticks

Ticks can cause your cat to become seriously ill and their bites can even be fatal. Paralysis ticks release a toxin which affects the nervous system leading to paralysis and eventually death, so protecting your cat is key.

Did you know?

You should check your cat daily for ticks during the risk periods.



Mites

Ear mites live in the ear canal, causing discharge, inflammation, itchiness and local allergic reactions, which can be very uncomfortable for your cat.

Did you know?

Ear mites are normally spread through direct contact with another infected animal.



Roundworms

These are the most common worms found in Australian cats and there are several ways your cat can become infected:

- By eating the eggs, which can survive in the environment for over a year
- Through hunting and eating infected prey
- Even young kittens aren't safe as the larvae can be passed from mum to kitten during nursing.

Did you know?

The larvae of roundworms can cause disease in humans.



Tapeworms

Tapeworms can cause gastrointestinal upsets in cats, and can also spread to humans. Cats that hunt are more prone to certain tapeworms which are transmitted through eating infected prey.

Did you know?

Some tapeworms are transmitted by fleas, so even indoor cats are at risk.



Lungworms and Hookworms

Both lungworms and hookworms can be transmitted to cats when they eat infected prey.

Did you know?

The larvae of hookworms can cause disease in humans.

Parasites often aren't visible, so why risk it?

Often you won't know if your cat has parasites, even if you monitor them closely. The best way to ensure they are protected is with regular parasite treatments - **it's not worth the risk!**
